Columbus Academy mourns death of star Madison

Columbus Academy boys tennis coach Marc Wurtzman fondly recalls Jack Madison's determination and leadership – in the sport and in everyday life.

The 2021 graduate capped his prep career by competing in the Division II individual and team state tournaments as a senior and continued his playing career at Colorado College, where he was a sophomore.

Madison, 20, of Bexley, died in his

sleep Jan. 2.

"He always put a smile on your face," Wurtzman said. "Everybody loved Jack. Players from other teams loved Jack. Jack will never be forgotten. He will be remembered

by all his friends, family and coaches and everybody in the Academy community."

Madison teamed with Arie Tuckerman, his cousin, to finish second in state doubles in 2019 and 2021. Competing in singles, Madison helped lead Academy to a third-place finish in the team state tournament in his senior season. Madison played the second half of the season with a hernia, which forced him to serve underhand. He underwent surgery after the season.

"He played a season in pain and just battled through it for the team," Wurtzman said.



At Academy, he developed a continued passion for painting; we'll cherish his paintings forever. Jack then attended Colorado College, where in his brief year and a half made dear friends for life. He went on to play tennis in college, but hernia complications kept him off the court, until this upcoming season where he was incredibly excited to play with his team. He told us recently that though he loved Colorado, his heart was in Columbus. He loved being with his family and friends when home. Jack planned to declare as a History Major and Journalism Minor, with the dream of coming back to his Alma Mater and teaching History. He loved to write about music, and was an Editor of the Catalyst, his college newspaper. He interviewed many musicians and renowned groups, and had multiple reviews published. He was excited to go on a family vacation to Siesta Key this week and "be with the family, sit on the balcony, watch the ocean, read and write." He loved playing the guitar and practiced daily. Jack also loved the outdoors and spent many nights by the campfire with his dear friends. This was written by Colorado College in the announcement of his passing. It describes him best. "Jack was fascinated by language and words; sound and music, and was crazy about art. He was a thoughtful writer, with his writing appearing in the Catalyst and through the SoCC Blog which he managed. He engaged fully with campus life in a myriad of ways, embracing CC to the fullest. Jack was observant, super imaginative, creative, and independent minded.
